## LCRT ANNUAL MEETING JUNE 12, EXCITING

This year 18 highly qualified LCRT members ran for the opportunity to govern LCRT. Usually people are begged to serve, however with the influx of new talent, the quality of past two seasons, plays in the coming season, plus our wonderful venue, more interest has been shown in our 20+ year-old



non-profit. Another opportunity to vote has been approved by the LCRT Board based primarily on the delayed distribution of the ballots (primarily by email) and concerns that some of the membership did not receive their ballot in time or the email was blocked as “SPAM”. The new ballot will be mailed via U.S. Post to the LCRT membership and must be returned to the LCRT P.O. Box by July 15, to be counted. The current Board of Directors shall remain in office until the next meeting of the board, July 21, 2004 where the 11

persons with the greatest number of votes shall be declared elected to serve for the coming fiscal year.

**OTHER ANNUAL MEETING NEWS:** The past two seasons, five LCRT performances (Lysistrata, Love Letters, Artificial Intelligence, and The Exonerated) generated over \$1,500 for Lake County Non-profit groups. We donated Opening Night net revenues to; Lake County Arts Council, Amnesty International, Lower Lake Schoolhouse Museum, and the Red Cross of Lake County. We began a scholarship program and awarded two scholarships to young women who are pursuing theater in college: 1st place winner, Christa Unger of Lower Lake High School, and 2nd place winner, Julia Chase of Middletown High School. The call for designs yielded nine submissions as a new LCRT logo.

**DECISIONS MADE:** The 2004-2005 season was re organized fit the schedule of the directors of the plays. Business card size ads are being sold in our Playbills for \$20 per show; Season ticket prices will go up in the fall to \$12 general, \$10 seniors and students and all LCRT members \$8. Also, is Radio Theatre in our future? Stay tuned.

## "To Kill a Mockingbird" auditions July 14- 6 PM at Yuba College Building 605

The play, written by Christopher Sergel, is an adaptation of Harper Lee's Pulitzer Prize winning novel and it will be the LCRT September production, directed by Voris Brumfield. Ms. Lee describes the play as "a love story, pure and simple": love for the South, a father's love for his children and their love for him. The story is about dignity, tolerance and the difficulties of growing up in a rural community in Alabama during the depression year of 1935. It is told through the eyes of Scout, the tomboyish daughter of Atticus. Racial

tensions have polarized the town and most of the white residents are against Atticus. The first act primarily is about the love between the father and his two children, Scout and Jem. The second deals with the a trial, with the Scout and Jem and their friend Charles watching the trial from the "color segregated balcony" in the courtroom. After watching the trial, the children gain a new respect for Atticus. There are parts for 3-5 children, 11 men and 6 women.
